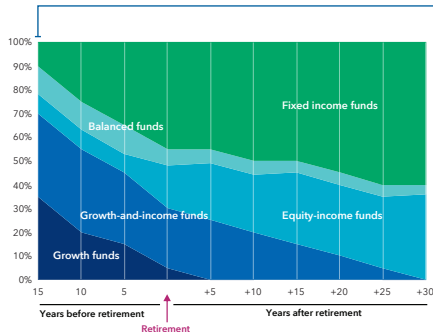




Inside American Funds® IS 2035 Target Date Fund

Investment objectives:
Depending on the proximity to its target date, which we define as the year that corresponds roughly to the year in which the investor expects to retire, the fund will seek to achieve the following objectives to varying degrees: growth, income and conservation of capital. The fund will increasingly emphasize income and conservation of capital by investing a greater portion of its assets in bond, equity-income and balanced funds as it approaches and passes its target date. In this way, the fund seeks to balance total return and stability over time.

The fund is designed for investors who plan to retire in, or close to, the year 2035 and begin withdrawing their money. Although the target date portfolios are managed for investors on a projected retirement date time frame, the allocation strategy does not guarantee that investors' retirement goals will be met. Investment professionals manage the portfolio, moving it from a more growth-oriented strategy to a more income-oriented focus as the target date gets closer. The target date is the year that corresponds roughly to the year in which an investor is assumed to retire and begin making withdrawals. Investment professionals continue to manage each portfolio for approximately 30 years after it reaches its target date.

Due to rounding methodology, totals may not add up to 100%.

The target allocations shown are as of May 31, 2021, and are subject to the oversight committee's discretion. The investment adviser anticipates assets will be invested within a range that deviates no more than 10% above or below the allocations shown in the prospectus. ▶ **American Balanced Fund**

- The investment objectives of the fund are: (1) conservation of capital, (2) current income and (3) long-term growth of capital and income.
- The fund invests primarily in common stocks and investment-grade fixed-income securities (rated Baa/BBB and above), using a balanced approach and a U.S. emphasis.
- Invests primarily in common stocks and preferred stocks, bonds, convertibles and cash.

▶ **Washington Mutual Investors Fund**

- The fund's investment objective is to produce income and to provide an opportunity for growth of principal consistent with sound common stock investing.
- The fund invests in stocks that meet strict standards evolving from requirements originally established by the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia for the investment of trust funds. May not invest in companies that derive their primary revenues from alcohol or tobacco.
- Primarily invests in common stocks and securities convertible into common stocks.

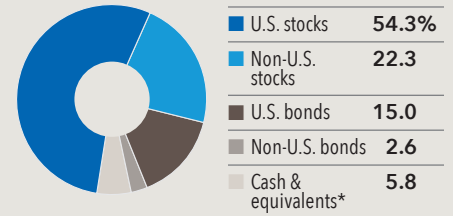
▶ **The Investment Company of America**

- The fund's investment objectives are to achieve long-term growth of capital and income.
- With an 80-plus-year track record, this fund invests primarily in larger, well-established companies that represent a wide cross section of the U.S. economy.
- Principally invests in common stocks; may also hold securities convertible into common stocks, as well as bonds (generally rated Baa or BBB or better, or unrated, but determined by the fund's investment adviser to be of equivalent quality), U.S. government securities, nonconvertible preferred stocks, and cash and equivalents.

▶ **AMCAP Fund**

- The fund's investment objective is to provide long-term growth of capital.
- Invests primarily in U.S. companies that have solid long-term growth records and the potential for good future growth.
- Primarily invests in U.S. common stocks, as well as convertible preferred stocks and cash and equivalents.
